





So on a wet Wednesday afternoon, I made by may to Tag Records and was led downstairs to the heart of Effective - a pretty smoky heart at that. There I met the crew: Lawrence Nelson and Simon Hanson, Steve Hanson (works in the shop) and John Bourke from News PR, the label's

publicist.

After a cup of tea and a quick call from Darren Emerson, we were ready to go. First a brief history. Both Lawrence and Simon have DJed for several years, although Simon finds little time for it now with the business and a family. In June 91, they set up Tag Records, having spent a bit of time in Ibiza and acquired a reputation for their Naked Lunch parties in London. Early in 92, the white label of 'Passion' came out and due to demand, they went for wider distribution. So, in June 92, the trio of Lawrence, Simon and Daren Emerson (a good friend and DJ companion of Simon's from the Twilight days) set up Effective Records. After 5 releases, the label decided to reorganise itself in order to upgrade its operations and in the process imported the talents from Denmark (Miro, Mental Generation). The label may not have had a huge number of releases, but Effective is not a success by

> percentages label. Considering the music and their ideas, it becomes

apparent that there are neither pretensions nor pigeonholes for the music or people at Effective. No particular type of music is preferred, not even a restriction to dance - Lawrence is even planning a spot of dabbling in funk and rock next year. However what is definite is a firm belief that mediocrity is not enough. Unfortunately the current scene seems dogged by the 'that will do' mentality and needs an increasing personal quality control by

labels.

Effective are also unfussed by the lack of a reputation as a particularly trendy of flavour of the month label. They want good quality releases, which will gain chart success - a simple fact but one many labels would be loathe to admit. "Dance is no longer underground, therefore there is no reason to treat it so - it's massively popular. America, Europe and Australasia are opening up to it and so it can't be seen as a minority area. Dance acts can be top 10, even No.1" Dancefloor success needn't mean indifference in the shops, and Effective believe its output should and can maintain a standard equal to 'Passion'. Good releases needn't be so difficult to

find - "An Our Price shop in Newcastle phoned us up

that trudging round tons of specialist shops on a wet Saturday, to be met by the 'should get some more on "We want to sign up dance acts as acts. Progression should be through the conventional way from single success to albums, together with the possibility of live shows. Dance promotion should be done in the same way as pop or rock acts.' All of this is confirmed in achieving their high sales targets — the target for the week was reached by the end of that Wednesday. There are trendier labels falling below far lower targets.

They would like to see themselves alongside FFRR, Junior Boys Own and Deconstruction expanding next year and becoming major players as a result of their attitude towards the scene. "There are too many dance labels, distributors and releases, and over the next 6 months many of these will go out of business. Even though sales are gradually picking up, the market is still a small one. The only labels that will continue, will be those who know exactly where they're going. It's the way it's always been. Obviously there is room for trendy labels, but it's too easy to make records at the moment. 10% of what we get is good, but there are too many mediocre releases. The situation is similar to what happened to the indie labels in the mid-80s. Only those like Mute, Beggars Banquet and 4AD are doing very well now. Dance is as commercially viable an industry as that of pop or rock, but

already uplifting those dancefloors, but I was allowed a quick preview of the new Miro track 'Celebrate', which Mr Tong has now played several times. And it's huge. "We are looking for it to achieve the crossover success of Pasion". And it will. It's got a true European feel to it (basically a superior Snap), co-written with some great vocals from a rising talent, Eddy. As well as these, they've licensed 4 new acts for the beginning of next year and are preparing an Effective album with some remixes of old tracks and some new stuff. This ought to be an impressive compilation due to its variety – the largeness of 'Passion' and 'Celebrate'; the uplifting 'Soul Sacrifice' and 'Positive

Energy'; onto the spacey ambience of 'Cafe Del Mar' (a personal favourite). And in case they have any time free, they'll be continuing their remix work for the likes of Logic, Pulse-8 and Strategy.

Effective certainly seems

to have got itself sorted on every front and could well be leading the surge next year in the dance scene. But personally it's the no nonsense, no prentensions approach to everything that impresses me most. And it's an approach that I hope will be seen through more labels in the new year. Let's have real passion in 94.







UNLIKE MANY OTHER RECORD LABELS, STRICTLY UNDERGROUND'S SUCCESS CAN BE ATTRIBUTED TO A SINGLE FACTOR. THAT THEY HAVE REMAINED TRUE TO THE IDEALS AND VALUES OF THE ORIGINAL RAVESCENE. AND SO GENERATOR SET OUT TO ROMFORD TO INTERVIEW THE FORCE BEHIND THIS HUGELY SUCCESSFUL LABEL, MARK RYDER.

Generator: How did your involvement with the dance music scene come about?

Mark Ryder: Believe or not, I used to be a computer programmer writing video games, but I've been a DJ ever since I can remember. I've always loved house music and used to do house parties - in fact we were renowned in our street for having house parties every Saturday, and were hated by everyone in our street. I didn't

realise that I could make money out of the dance thing at that time, but the more I got into programming the more I hated it. Sometimes I had to go into Liverpool St at 3am so that the operators could tap in information and then I couldn't get a train back home until 8 o'clock.

So I jacked it in and got a job at Our Price Records. A jock in Our Price! I used to get all my records cheap and I started my first proper DJing job. I travelled down to Hastings and you can imagine what it was like... I had to play chart tunes to keep promoters happy, you can imagine the pressure I was under, so I was always cutting up records, I cut anything trying to get away with playing hip hop and house, and that's how I learnt to mix up records. I went into those DMC mixing competitions and used to win all the heats but then get knocked out by people like Hype - it's funny 'cos me and Hype we were on quite a par at that time.

Then I met Dave Lee (Joey Negro) in a record shop in London and me and Dave hit it off straight away. I did a load of tracks with him and was of course learning a hell of a lot at this time. Dave was a garage man, that's where his heart lay, but my heart was with something harder, more Steve "Silk" Harley based. We got ripped off more than once, and that's when I realised that if you want something doing well, you do it yourself. That meant setting up my own label.

Generator: When did you know Strictly Underground was going to be a success?

MR: That's difficult to say because I don't treat the label as a successful label or an unsuccessful label . When I look at what I've got compared to other labels that I respect, though, I suppose it is. Perhaps even more than them, because I don't push the label endlessly to the punter. I don't push it full stop, really. I just make records. Under lots of different names.

Generator: Is there any particular reason you choose to record under a different name?

Purely because people and punters don't always understand me. Everyone needs something to latch onto, a label, a pigeon hole and that kind of thing. People like to associate with something and all I want to do is make house music. People don't realise how diverse the stuff I've written is, and that, for example I co-wrote the early Joey Negro stuff. It's a combination of everything really.

Generator: Who are the other people that you're collaborating with at the moment?

stant phenomonen that's always there. Rave is about energy and experiencing all those people dancing together. It's more than just music, it's an experience, it's cultural. But Strictly Underground does more than just what you might label 'rave music', the fact is that it's house music as a whole that gives me a buzz. It's what I love...I'm up there (points to studio) 24 hrs a day sometimes making music I love.

> enerator: Which direction do you think the ravescene is heading in at the moment?

> > MR: I dont think it's dying, like some would say, there's enough people who love it out there. There is innovation out there -Hackney Hardcore, for example, have been sampled by every respectable hardcore label I know, and from the Prodigy to pop music outfits.

Generator: Is the music getting played out as much as it was or as much as it should?

MR: I think it's getting played out, but there aren't as many places to play it at as there were. Next year I think the law is going to get so tight it will be more or less impossible to put on a rave. They just won't be able to

not saying! I'd rather not say to tell you the truth, and to be quite honest I don't think it matters. All that mat-

ters is you like what you hear. If you don't like hardcore thats fine, that's your prerogative, but give Strictly Underground a listen before you have an opinion.

Generator: How would you describe Strictly Underground with regard to its overall sound?

I'd describe it as a house label. We've gone through a heavy phase of hardcore rave, but that doesn't mean that's what we do all the time and what we'll do forever more. If you look back to the early stuff it's what you'd call garage. Rave's where we're at though. Rave has come up and shone brighter than anything else ever except sixties Rock'n' Roll. When people look back at music it will be sixties music and Rave that will stand out, and everything in between will be discounted as pop. Pop music is just a con-

go off. There's a section on the album (Sonic Experience, Def Till Dawn) where the police are trying in vain to tell 30,000 people at a rave to calm down! That sort of thing won't even get to happen next year, due to new legislation and new police powers. I hope it does, but the police are so onto it that the law and their powers will stop the events and because of that the whole rave culture will shrink. You won't be able to play records to 30 000 people and feel that buzz, and that's what rave is after all.

Generator: Why do you think people are afraid of rave culture?

What it is, is that this government or any other government don't like kids they can't control. That's it. The older generation just don't understand the younger generation. History tells you that. Nowadays the government have the power to making sweeping changes. And they're backed up by the police. For example, because of the car I drive I get pulled a minimum of once a month by police in Essex who all know me! Their powers are amazing.

Generator: Tell us about the Sonic Experience Def Till Dawn album.

MR: The Sonic Experience Album is a way of saying the label's got an album out about the ravescene that's endorsed by us and how we feel about rave music. Some people might hear it and say I've heard these sounds before, but what we're trying to do is make a diary of what we like about rave. When you hear it, if you were to close your eyes and turn the music up, you'd go on a trip into rave culture. And if you've never been to rave you'll get a very good idea of what it's like!

Generator: Have you sorted the distribution out yet?

MR: Yes, it's going out in the usual places. Our Price, HMV and local underground record shops.

Generator: So you are bringing underground into the

MR: I'm not interested in that kind of comment, wherever our product goes is where it goes. Strictly Hardcore, for example, is basically an album of stuff I like and make available for a wider audience. I got fucked of with those wankers putting out their rave compilations like "Hardcore Ecstasy 37". They've been putting out shit for too long saying this is rave, or that is rave, so, yes, it's my way of cutting into a market. Those sort of things piss me off, they really make my blood boil. A lot of people have worked hard to create rave and to make it what it is.

Generator: Which part of the country does Strictly Underground product sell best in?

MR: Strictly Hardcore is a country wide thing, and sells equally right across the country. Strictly Underground is more London based, but available everywhere too. It's just a question of asking of what's new on SU at all good record shops. For example, Hackney Hardcore has a new single coming out and the new MDM single Fly Free is coming out, too.

Give it a listen. If you like it, great, if you don't, you don't. It won't hurt me and it tells me whether I'm doing things right or not. I want people to buy our stuff because they like the music. That's basically what we're about. I don't want some snidey git to buy it 'cos it's

'the true rave album', because that's not what we're about. We want him to buy it because he is the true raver 'cos he likes it, 'cos he understands it. If you don't understand it we want you to buy it and try to understand. We don't want people to say "I've got a wicked picture disc and it's on my wall", 'cos that's not the point. The picture disc is there 'cos it's a firing front

quite easily do to make my label competitive. Smart-E's (Sesame's Treet) is the biggest piss off I've ever known. It came out on Surburban Base (I don't like their other stuff much either) but that was the worst record in rave history. If anyone says the Prodigy killed rave I'd fucking swear at them like anything because I think the Prodigy are extremely talented. 'Charly' is an excellent song. They didn't make that song to be a hit, it was made for all the right reasons, and if you try and compare that to Smart-E's there's no comparison.

We all know why Surburban Base made Smart-E's: they wanted a pop hit. Anyone who says different is fooling themselves, and that includes Surburban Base. They might as well just accept that they put out a shit record and it made them successful. No respect to them 'cos they just wanted to increase their cash flow. And it hurts all of us, not just them. It's hurt the whole scene and it will continue to do so because the whole pop mechanism has now absorbed the rave community as Smart-E's and spat it out again. There's a heck of a lot of talent out there and they won't get a look in because of Smart-E's. If that hadn't happened we'd still be on a massive thing now, rave would still be phenomanally big and there would be a lot of people making a lot of money.

Suddenly, though, rave music became pop music and the music scene just split. As there wasn't another Smart E's record released for the media to latch on to, they said the scene was dead. But it's all there, it's still as big as it was but it's split into 200 capacity venues.

Whatever your diversification and individual preference you should say you like house, not all these stupid names that cause conflict and splitting which is not what it should be about. It's about unity you understand. Yeah, unity. Unity. If it's house, it's house, rather than those fucking wankers who say 'I coined the term Progressive and I'm going to put it in my magazine'. Magazines can never have any control over the scene. A lot of magazines don't reflect the scene. They try and lead it instead. And how can a magazine lead music? It can't!

Music is something that only the person or people involved in making it can change. It has to be written by someone with soul. Not by the Smart-E's. I know I keep bringing that up! Most people making underground house music are making it from the heart. Even dark comes from the heart. If people slag it off it's 'cos they don't understand it. If music is listened to and bought, then there are markets for it and people who understand it. The true underground will only survive if the people stay with it.

cover that I felt I had to do.

Normally I don't go in for gimmicks, we don't usually do picture bags - it's just not what we are about. I let the other labels do that. We sell records 'cos they are good, not because they are blue, green, or pink with stickers. I won't make a Smart-E's type record, which I could


Back to the bus and back to the Smoke. To a party on the 20th floor of a Battersea tower block, to be precise. A journey that took us through a service


surprises and, probably, extended hours!

that, on occasions such as these, it's not been unknown for **Dave Clarke** to break out the champagne!



If this sounds like your kind of fun then you should probably take note of the Active Force 'Hanger' EP, out now on Kore.

Also available at the moment is the second release from new Edinburgh label, Relentless Recordings. The gloriously titled 'Fast

Elvis/Motivator' by Solar Channel follows on from the debut Relentless release, 'Solar Trance'/'Perfect Time', also by Solar Channel, which received a glowing review from Kris Needs. Both releases are representative of a powerful techno sensibility, quite unlike any other Scottish label. All those who enjoy their techno hard, lean and Detroit-influenced would be well advised to keep an eye out for future Relentless releases.

M*A*S*H are running a new club, fortnightly at La Bell Angele in Edinburgh's Cowgate. Familiarly named Burger Queen, they aim to present 100% Happy House with residents Alan Luvdup and Craig Drysdale. Next nights are on December 4th and 18th. Don't discount the possibility of a festive appearance by other members of the Luvdup clan!

Hubba Hubba have been exceptionally busy this month, making sure that there are plenty of groovy House tunes under the Christmas tree. Well recommended is the 'Soft Drinks' EP by Cotillion, a suitably funky tribute to what we in the North call 'ginger', Dub Commission's Robert Aitken. Also from Hubba Hubba comes the vinvl debut of Stevie Donaldson, sometime DJ at The Arches, who has just finished a tour with One Dove. A funky outing along house meets


Talkin' Loud lines, 'Coney Island' by Bamboo is one to watch out for. Massive record of the month from this label though, is Harrison Crump's 'Sounds of Life' EP Classic Chicago house, recommended to you by DJ Pierre and Roy Davis Jnr amongst others, all the way from the USA to Falkirk!

This will be the opening night of a new monthly club

For those who need a break from the main event, Davy Brown will be playing alongside the excellent Martin Valentine and Chris Mann. Negotiations are currently underway for future quests, including proposed dates for David Morales and Todd Terry, so get down there on the 25th and claim your membership for what promises to be a very special club.

Congratulations go to Ayr-based Up Records, who've had their first No 1, in Malaysia of all places, with Jagga's 'Finito'. Expect a new release from them, sometime in the New Year, with another Jagga offering, 'Tarantino'.

Meanwhile at 23rd Precinct and Limbo HQ there has been something of a reshuffle, with new offices being built and new members of staff joining to cope with the label's ever-spiralling success. Rumours that a special

Recommended is the new Probe EP 'Edible Tracks Vol. 1', tough and heavy house with attitude to spare, which is already receiving much attention on the nation's more tuned-in dance floors. Luckily, The Tunnel should still be in one piece when he arrives - no thanks to a well-known live act whose over-zealous use of pyrotechnics set the place on fire last month. A special mention should go, at this point, to Inner Seduction who have certainly earned themselves the title of hottest act in town!

Carnival at The Calton in Edinburgh is a new Thursday night event which aims to provide 'party music for party people' from 10pm 'til late. In addition to a suitably varied selection of quality dance music, they're also offering, bizarrely enough, free popcorn. Now, I bet there are a lot of other promoters who are wishing they had thought of that!

Clubscene move into video this month with the release of a 50 minute Ultra-Sonic special filmed at various venus.

A great night was had

by all at Clydebank's Sound Factory when Todd Terry flew in last month for a onenight-only appearance in Scotland. Commiserations to anyone who missed it but there is still a chance to catch up on NRG there on Sunday nights with DJs Stevie Kerr and Joe The Bear. For those of a less nervous disposition, check out the regular Hacienda Roadshow on Fridays, with PAs this month by the ubiquitous Ultra-Sonic and the increasingly more apparent Dance Overdose. Incidentally, Stevie Kerr is also part of the team behind the excellent Bobby Dazzler single, 'Skyscraper' on 23rd Precinct's new Marimba label.

Getting to grips with technology, in studios throughout Scotland, recently

have been, amongst others, Slam who have been remixing Jean Michel Jarre's 'Chronologie' for dance floor consumption, La Rue working on a follow-up to their acclaimed 'Cathedral Song' for Stress, Suburban Delay completing their new single and the tireless Stuart Crichton of Mukkaa, Solo, Ready For Dead and Jagga, who has not only been working with Jon Reid on a new Nightcrawlers single but also found time to remix the new Apollo 440 single 'Astral America' into a 140 bpm acid stomper.



MR C IS A PERSONALITY WHO NEEDS NO INTRODUCTION TO ANYONE WHO HAS THE REMOTEST INTEREST IN THE MUSIC SCENE. WHEN GENERATOR JOURNIED INTO EAST LONDON TO MEET UP, THOUGH, IT WASN'T WITH PRE-CONCEIVED IDEAS OF THE SHAMEN'S GALLUP-FRIENDLY CATCHY MELODIES AND HIS POP PERSONA. WE WENT TO HEAR OF WHERE HE'S REALLY FROM, AND WHERE HE'S AT. OF THE ACID UNDERGROUND THAT HE VALUES ABOVE ALL ELSE, AND OF HIS PERSONAL AND SPIRITUAL INVESTMENT IN IT BY WAY OF PLINK PLONK RECORDS. SO READ ON, AND, AMONG OTHER THINGS, YOU'LL AT LAST UNDERSTAND THE TRUTH BEHIND THE LEGEND OF FATHER CHRISTMAS... WHAT!?

Generator: How did the Plink Plonk label come about?

Mr C: The name refers back to parties in 1988. I was dancing to Kid Batchelor's set, he played a track by Lil' Louis which completely blew me away, and the sounds I was getting out of the speakers were "plink, plonk...plink, plonk" - the track was called The Way I Feel. I knew that had to be the name of a label one day.

We eventually started it up about a year ago, so that was four and a half years later up the road - when I could afford to do it properly. Obviously it was basically The Shamen's success that gave me the money to do it.

Generator: People who set up their own projects usually have quite defined ideas about what they're doing and why they're doing it...

Mr C: The philosophy behind Plink Plonk is to get experimental music out into the shops. The whole dance music umbrella is in a way a bit of a parody of itself now, and that's a shame. Especially for those of us who have been in it since 1986\87. Now people are laughing at dance music, now raves are laughed at, acid parties are just there to let capitalist people make money with dodgy sound systems and dodgy DJs, and it's become a bit of a farce. Yet it's the thing I love, and that's why the label was set up. There's so many people about who've really got it, get they've never had the money to go into the studio, they've not had the contacts to blag it, and generally the labels around only want stuff that they perceive as commercially viable. They don't want the experimental.

Everything we do on Plink Plonk is totally different from the last track. We're moving, changing and evolving all the time. Dance music is something that has always beem metamorphisising, we feel we're ahead. Everyone involved really knows the music, and by really knowing the music, by knowing what's experimental and what's mainstream, we're always going to break new ground. And that's what Plink Plonk is about.

Generator: And for the uninitiated, how would you describe the sound of the label?

Mr C: Futuristic, psychedelic, Psyber. We can't really say we're under the house umbrella or under the techno umbrella.

Psyber is a title that Colin Shamen came up with people kept saying we're a techno band, which we're not, or a pop band, which we're not. We're psyber. And that's a good way to describe Plink Plonk. It's not regressive in any way, and it's not neccessarily for the dancefloor. To be quite honest, I'd much rather see people sitting at home listening to an intelligent Plink Plonk track than dancing to garage crap and swallowing dodgy pills.

Generator: What's your exact day to day role in the label?

Mr C: Basically I'm the person who set it up. I run it with a partner Paul Rip who did all the parties back in 88\89, basically because he's the most open-minded

one on the label works under a pseudonym, because it's the music that's important. Who gives a shit who made it? We want to turn people on to music, not marketing, and that's what's important.

Take Megalon, for example. Megalon are real house people who've been around since the beginning. I'm not going to reveal their identities, but one of them has been DJing alongside me since 1988. Everything from New York garage to Detroit techno. These are people who have never had the opportunity or the money to get their thing together in the studio and express themselves. One of their very first tunes in the studio was "Incantation". I mean, how can that be someone's first record!? Wow! These are people that know the way things should be going. They've seen the spacy side of things, the psychedelic side. Megalon have that deep edge because they know that that is

the way forward. The album that
they're working on is just
incredible. And I've only
heard half of it. It'll be out
around March time next
year.

Generator: Can you see Plink Plonk taking off abroad?

Mr C: I think San Francisco is quite an obvious place, but I don't see why it shouldn't take off everywhere. Especially seeing what's coming out of New York at the moment, labels like Deep Dish, and all the technoheads - they're doing some good stuff. Derrick Carter and that from Chicago, they're making bad music, so they're going to jump on it, it's right up their street. Europe is having it. The Germans are buying it up at 2000 copies at a time. That's fine, it's very underground specialist music.

Generator: You've mentioned some of the things that are wrong with the UK dance scene earlier. Is there anything we do particularly well?

Mr C: The British pop thing is all well and good. It's never going to change. It's pushing artists that haven't got a clue about anything, singing crap songs with the obvious mixes on. As far as dance music and experimental stuff is concerned, there's a lot of good ambient stuff coming out which is going to break a lot of new ground. After all, ambient can cross over to a much wider audience than just dance circles - to indie kids and older people that were into Jean Michel Jarre, etc. It's very classical, and really ambient music is no more than

s the thing person I've met. He's really got the right attitude, towards sound and pushing barriers. And like labels

towards sound and pushing barriers. And like myself, he gets bored very easily. I do a bit of mixing, and I've done a couple of tracks. I push the other artists and make sure everything is there so we can grow as a label.

Generator: Do you see the Plink Plonk sound of today crossing over into the mainstream of tommorow?

Mr C: If the experimental sound we've got does catch on and cross over in some way, all well and good. We've got artists like Megalon and Wild West and Pluto, and if they get big then great, let them earn enough money to develop their own sound and own studio. It's about time the mainstream got into psychedelic dance music. If psychedelic dance music does become commercial we'll find another way of pushing it even further. We've got to get the message across to the people who are stuck in an egotistical, capitalistic way of being. The thing is, a lot of the Plink Plonk artists are really well known under their real names. Every-

techno without drums. And that's how techno should sound - with beautiful swoops and arpeggios and beautiful shapes flowing across the room. That's what techno should be like. But with drums. Like some of the stuff that you'd find Eye-Q, Irresistable Force and Plink Plonk are doing.

Actually we've got an ambient collection being compiled at the moment. Which isn't to say we won't put anything out over the 120-140 bpm mark, 'cause we will. There's no speed limits. The only limit we've got is agression. Our music has to be in its own way psychedelic, but not aggressive, that's where we draw the line. You know...that agression that you see in clubs and raves, the macho tops off. I don't like that, it's not nice. When music gets too fast, say around 145\150 bpm you can't dance properly any more - you have to jump from foot to foot. When the music becomes jumpy it gets harder, nosebleedy, a bit aggressive. Why I say aggressive is because people can no longer

music is slower you've got a bit of space between the beats and the sexier you can get with a partner on the floor. And as sex is the lowest common denominator for reaching an altered state of conciousness, that's what it's all got to be about.

Generator: So you won't be taking your holiday in Rotterdam, then?

Mr C: NO WAY! I hate Rotterdam! I hate it - it's a horrible place. Love Amsterdam, though. People do need to get away from boom, boom, bloody boom.

Generator: So tell us, where do you get your biggest buzz from at the moment? Is it Plink Plonk, The Shamen...

Mr C: (tongue in cheeky smile) It's from drugs. No, seriously, it's hard to say. I'm a music man. I love what's happening at the label, I'm really excited about the (Parasols) album coming out, the edits are just incredible. The label's got some terrific stuff. I'm excited about DJing, some of the parties I've been doing are beautiful. DJing is where I'm originally from, and I'm still excited with what you

OUTSIDE "ALMOST IN"

There are several reasons why Outside's debut album is astonishing. Firstly, 20 year old Matt Cooper is responsible for all keyboards and drums on this album which he has also written and produced himself. Secondly, the album is a seamless blend of soul, funk and jazz, taking in influences such as Roy Ayers, the Blackbyrds, Don Blackman etc., while at the same time never sounding pointlessly retro (unlike certain artists with large hats). BT LEWIS DENE SOW BEEN TIME

"In 1988 Carl and Andy, the original two members, put together a band called Interstate which sprung out of their interest in groups like Kraftwerk, Depeche Mode and New Order," starts chief spokesman Paul Roberts. "The first time we saw them was doing a gig supporting 808 State in Chester. We'd bought some really cheap naff equipment that really was good for nothing, but we wanted to be like 808 State, do some really cheapo tracks, but we didn't know what the hell we were doing. Andy (Williams) and Carl (Thomas) had a much better idea. The week after Russ (Morgan) and I saw them at the Hacienda, we stayed out with them the whole night and after went straight to Andy's house. The equipment they had was incredible, we went `oh yeah, look at all this equipment, look it works! That 909 drum machine actually sounds like the ones on the records, not that pile of shit that I bought!' We ended up recording four tracks over the next couple of weeks and when we finished we took the tape into Eastern Bloc in Manchester to see what they thought, hoping that we could impre on them. E-Bloc thought they were brilliant and wanted to put them out as an EP straight away, they came out as the `Wildlife EP'."

It's a little know fact how the group came to be so named, and believe it or not this is their official explanation... "First of all we were going to get a dictionary and stick a pin in a page to find a name," Paul continues, anticipating what's to come next. "But it fell on `M' and the word `Masturbation'! So we couldn't use that. At that time John Peel was playing a lot of American hip-hop on his show and he played this record by Spelt With A K, so we used it as a play on words. However we later found out it was also the name of a British submarine!" At this point having waited patiently in the wings, Russell Morgan finally got his chance to add to the conversation. "And it was steam powered. In 1912 they went to sea and they all sunk, every single one of them! We actually found a book about them, the summing up on the back was by the Captain of the fleet who said that without doubt K-Klass was a total disaster! Which sums us up completely."


Messrs Roberts, Morgan, Thomas and Williams, four Welsh sounding lads if ever there were, together with vocalist Bobbi Depasois in 1991 enjoyed their greatest moment to date with 'Rhythm Is A Mystery', a top three pop hit which they referred to as "a real surprise". Paul takes up the story: "When we recorded it originally it was an average techno'ish vocal track. It sold quite well, about 12,000 through Eastern Bloc, then they said why don't you do a more accessible mix? When we'd finished it we thought it was the best thing we'd done to date. A couple of weeks later we went to the Hacienda on a Friday night and Mike Pickering dropped it and the whole place went bang! We just stood there gob smacked, that wasn't meant to happen, that's when we knew we had a big hit on our hands."

The singles, 'So Right' and 'Don't Stop', then followed: "We had an album worth of material done and ready to go ages ago, but Eastern Bloc paid for all the studio time and owed it all, plus back then most of the tracks were mainly instrumental. We had a lot of legal trouble with them and in the end lost a lot of stuff. Straight after `Don't Stop' an album should've come out, but we were late starting to record it, then when we'd finished recording it we got our publishing cheque through for `Rhythm Is A Mystery' and with the money went away and built our own studio. We then re-recorded the

whole album because we preferred the sound we got out of the new equipment! We originally recorded it at Out Of The Blue in Manchester, we had lots of parties and it took a long time and we didn't get much done. We spent about seventeen grand doing it, then we thought let's get our shit together. We're now getting to the true reason why it took so long, but we had a damn good laugh in the process!"

The net result is their debut set 'Universal', which they'd like to be considered not just an album for dancing to, but also for listening and enjoying, too. Included is the current single `Let Me Show You' together with the track 'La Casa' featuring the nifty strumming of ex-Smith, The The and Electronic guitarist Johnny Marr. "We initially thought it was an unusual pairing when he approached us to do a track. We share a mutual admiration for one another, and when you meet him and see his record collec-

Other credits on the Deconstruction debut include Terry Farley and Peter Heller of Junior Boy's Own, who've remixed 'Don't Stop' and Generator favourite Andy Weatherall's Sabres Of Paradise mix of the track '1,2,3'.

Also known to dabble in the remix game themselves (Seven Grand Housing Authority their most recent success) they've had to turn down the chance of remixing New Order's next single 'Spooky', due to "work commit-

ment" after their initial success at the mixing desk with Ruined In A Day' and `World' for them. With their next official project being `Lover' for London Record's artist Joe Roberts. And as to their own material, the group are actually considering releasing something totally new, a quick session in the studio before the next onslaught of club and tour dates.

As to the future, Paul Roberts sees the scene evolving and constantly reinventing itself, and is confident to expect the unexpected: "No one can say what direction it will go in next, if you could it would be boring and

have died a long time back. The best thing is no-one knows what's coming next. People have tried to write off house music since it arrived in 1987, they used to slag me off and ask me why I was buying gay disco" And we couldn't go without letting Russell Morgan have the final words on the subject: "House music is the perfect music to dance to. If it was going to go away it would've gone by now, but it keeps reinventing itself. I'm certainly far from bored with it."



FOR THE PAST 2 YEARS, RABBIT CITY'S ARTISTS RATE AMONG THE WORLD'S MOST RESPECTED TECHNO ACTS AND ILLUMINATAE'S RELEASES ARE A REGULAR FEATURE OF ANY SELF RESPECTING BUZZ CHART. THE CREATOR OF ALL THESE MUSICAL GEMS IS HOWEVER SOMEWHAT OF AN ENIGMA. WE MET UP IN A VERY NOISY RESTAURANT IN COVENT GARDEN TO FIND OUT WHY GORDON MATTHEWMAN CHOOSES TO BE A BACKROOM BOY.

C.C.: Gives us a quick outline of the projects and labels that you're involved with.

G.M.: I run Rabbit City Records with Colin Faver. Colin runs the A&R side of things because he's got such a good ear for music, and while I am involved on the production side of some of the tracks, I mainly concentrate on the day to day running of the label. I run Edge Records on my own and have been involved with the production of most of the Edge releases. I wrote and produced Edge Records 1,2,3,4 and 9 and co wrote and produced 7,8 and 10 (Edge Records releases are referred to by number not name!) XVX was set up for collaboration projects, but so far it's just been a collaboration between me and Doug Osbourne, the other half of Illuminatae!

C.C.: How did you come to set up Edge Records, Rabbit City and XVX?

G.M.: I was a trained trumpet player and signed an album deal with Ten Records' dance dept, in 1998 under the name Blow. The whole project went a bit off course and I really didn't feel it was the right place for me to be, so I decided to set up Rabbit City and Edge Records as outlets for my music. I wanted to make cool dance tracks with trumpets in them and if you listen to Rabbit City 1 and Edge 3 you'll actually hear my trumpet playing, but on the rest of the releases I've sort of veered away from doing that. I'm still really into the idea and it's something I want to do a lot more of in the future. XVX came abou;t when I went into the studio to do a track with Doug. It came out sounding nothing like an Edge Records release so I set up XVX, as I said before, for collaborative projects.

C.C.: Why do you write and produce under pseudonyms?

G.M.: When I put out the first Edge release I was stamping the promos, and there weren't enough letters in the printing kit to write my whole name so I just put Edge 1 and it's just gone on from there! Actually, all the Edge Records logo is, is a printing kit spliced in half.

C.C.: It seems that you try to distance yourself from the music industry and the media. You do very limited mailouts, rarely give interviews and don't court media attention, is this a conscious decision and if so why? **G.M.:** I don't really know enough about the music industry to start trying to play the big corporate game. I suppose I could go out and buy the front cover of Music Week or something, but I'd probably end up wasting a load of money and ballsing it all up. If I was going to try to court media attention and try to get into the limelight I'd want to do it properly, I'd want to get a lot of advice from people who knew what they were doing first. As it is there are only a certain number of hours in a day, and I'd rather concentrate on the music because that's what's most important.

C.C.: If a major label offered you loads of money and wanted to make you into a superstar what would you do?

G.M.: I'd have to cross that bridge when I came to it. I don't know though, I kind of like things the way they are at the moment, so I guess it would have to be an incredibly good offer!!

C.C.: Are there any musicians or producters out there who really inspire you, or who you'd like to work with?

G.M.: I'd have to say Pete Namlook from Fax Records in Germany. I don't know him but I really like the stuff he's involved with. He does a lot of jazz influenced ambient tracks with really subtle rhythms and lots of saxophone and live guitars. I'd like to play trumpet on one of his records.

C.C.: What projects are you working on at present?


G.M.: I've just released Edge 10, which includes 2 tracks that I did with Lenny Dee. Doug and I have finished one of the tracks for the next Illuminatae release and that should be out in the new year.


C.C.: Where do you see yourself in 5 years time?

G.M.: In a studio where the neighbours don't bang on the walls, where the police don't come round every 2 days to complain about the noise and where the council don't write me letters all the time telling me to turn the volume down!








-The North of England has always been relatively infamous for its characteristic adaptability: joy-riding, ram-raiding, pre-teen rioting (known locally as 'freefestivals'). Like so many cities there is precious little for young people in Newcastle. At present almost half of the town's nightclubs are closed or in receivership. Local radio caters to the middle-aged, middle of the road mire. Now there are new voices with plenty to say, as young people take control of the airwaves. ICE FM, a 24 hour Dance station is operating at the edge of the dial uncomfortably midway between a coded Police signal and one particularly conventional broadcaster. Working with a 28 day Restricted Service License, sheer enthusiasm carries the project through the initial confusion of starting from scratch. It is provocative, energetic, challenging, and essential.

Technically ICE are no threat to convention. What makes the competition anxious is the fact that two young students recognised an opportunity and fulfilled an economic demand. The operation has cost about £6,500. Almost all of which has been self-financed. All staff are unpaid volunteers. Everyone involved is involved because they want to be. These optimists are fuelled by uncut enthusiasm. People are doing this for the project, the music and the community. Begged, borrowed, or even bought, much of their equipment is second rate. Not exactly what you'd expect from a studio broadcasting live 24 hours a day. As Manager, Robin Norton believes these are necessary risks: "It's time and energy worth



investing. Sometimes they pay off. Sometimes they don't. The whole structure is an experiment. From the license to the shows to the management, we work in a very experimental way which can be problematic. It isn't always good, but then why should it be?" The liveliness of the station, with its mistakes and technical mishaps, are all part of the fun. The only thing they disrupt is the numbing monotony that characterises more othodox broadcasts.

As Programmer, Trevor Blackman recognises and responds to the diversities of the audience: "The message is so strong. Anyone in the community with access to a radio can tune in to 87.7 at any given time, regardless of who they are." Unlike other broadcasters ICE transmit the music that their audience identify with. The team are very conscious of reflecting a wider world. Many radio stations simply don't identify with reality. Trevor Blackman recognises that particular problem: "We have to actively create a manifestation of real life. We are human beings and the problems of being human are more evident on ICE than anywhere else."

In a curious parallel with the computer revolution, dance music has weaved a complex web of fragmenting sounds — from the funky collage of hip-hop to the undiluted vibes of the freshest modern jazz, from the compressed aggression of hardcore to the advanced electronics of an ambient future. As a Dance station ICE tries to reflect each of these fragments, playing Gospel, Jazz, Soul and House music. As Robin Norton explains,



"We knew there was certainly a market for it here, but were all tentatively optimistic, never quite beliving it, until that first day came. Now that we are on air, everyone can hear that we have at least some degree of competence." He believes their strategy functions like a sampler, enabling people to access different sounds, different music, and as a result enjoy those alternatives. "What we really play is stuff that no-one else will touch."

Neither Guru Veej nor his side-kick The Mad Sikh had previous radio experience, but now for the first time their listeners can be tempted by the sounds of bhangra, classical Indian music and raghas. For them it was more than just an opportunity to play music with a lighthearted presentation: "Our's is really the first independent bhangra show. Every show reflects a different part of what being an Indian in England is all about." Radio at the very least should provide a voice for silent communities; at base an information base that immediately reflects local events. By responding to the need for a more diverse musical interest than that generally offered by orthodox broadcasters, community stations - legal and illegal - have a genuine social impact. Perhaps the key to any success is to treat people with the respect they deserve.

Out of 60 staff, 20 people involved with ICE FM have worked previously on renegade stations. In simple terms pirates respond to demand. Radio piracy has an electronic immediacy conspicuously lacking in a retrogressive medium. Mobile phones, pagers, fax

machines keep the airwaves informed of instant developments. By tuning in, people connect with an entire information network. In the capital city it's hard to avoid pirate broadcasts because there are more than 20 currently on the air, responding to a direct need ignored by established radio.

DREAM FM are one of the most professionally run pirate stations in northern Britain. Despite allegations made by their local press, these 'irresponsible anarchists' operate very responsibly with regulatory guidelines for their own presenters. Contrary to critics, they recently raised over £250,000 for the homeless in Leeds. DREAM have one particular purpose: "We want to revolutionise radio. It's a massive medium for everyone." Their's is a pro-active approach, emphasising their responsibility to the community by providing an avenue for involvement; from training salespeople to teaching kids how to DJ. "What we're doing is presenting something new and interesting in people's lives. Instead of standing on street corners causing havoc,

it's important that young people have something to do." DREAM believe this evident need within the community exceeds the legislation on pirate broadcasters: "I don't think we should need to go legal. If you can prove a case and not harm anyone then so be it. We are responsible to our listeners and to our community. I believe in what we're doing and feel confident that what we're doing is right."

Jungle DJ Sammon is, in his own terms, "a pirate right down the line." In the last three years his reputation has grown; Sammon has even been offered a show on legal stations, but turned it down because of play-list censorship: "I'll always choose illegal stations because no-one will ever tell me what to play or say."

Operating with a 100 watt transmitter enables PARADISE FM to reach beyond their Bradford base, and throughout West Yorkshire. In the last five years their listening

To set up as a pirate is relatively straightforward. The beauty of radio is that you can transmit from anywhere and only have to sound good. The equipment you use at first is not that important. You will need a reasonably comfortable studio and a reliable source to obtain a transmitter; someone you can trust not to grass when money gets tight. Unlike some fully equipped pirates, ICE FM have done things the hard way by playing by the rules. License costs alone amount to £3500, which would be an impossibility for unemployed kids on Meadowell Estate, but as presenter Nathan West contends. "This music is being pushed into the middle class, where it can be controlled in clubs and manipulated by mainstream media. We recognise what's happening, and want the station to reach out to everyone. We have worked from institutions to connect with non-institutional communities. We're just utilising what's available; hopefully using it

to everyone's advantage."

Pirates are exciting alternatives but now is an ideal time to create more permanent change. The DTI have finally opened up competition and seem to be granting more licenses than every before. Anyone should be able to get a license and that means you. A month might not seem a long time, but in 28 days you can prove a point and make an identity for yourself. Nathan West conceives, "We need to build the energy within the first month. Then keep a following motivated by club nights, house parties and promotional events until we're back on air. There's a lot of good DJs here who don't get air-play. The station gives them a chance."

Unlike America where freedom of speech forms the basis of the Constitution, in Britain the aristocracy still dominates the land and owns everything else, including the







figures have risen to an estimated 150,000 across Yorkshire. Again, their inception rose from a clear need in direct response to "the lack of Black music being played on legal stations." Lamaj was one of the first people involved with PARADISE. He has stories of renegade DJs setting up stations in direct competition, of stabilising rooftop aerials in force 10 gales, of broadcasting breakfast shows in dripping wet clothes. This man is dedicated. What advice would he give someone who wanted to set up their own station. "My advice? The truth: don't do it. Not unless you've got lots of money. As a pirate you're not just fighting the government, you're fighting everyone else who wants to see you go under. The listeners are your only allies." Piracy can be a thankless task. Above all, it demands lots of groundwork. Finding out which frequencies are free, and will provide the necessary foundation and distinction: "We patrolled the frequencies for 6 weeks to find a clear signal that wouldn't interefere with anyone." Lamaj believes that the pirates who have no regard for emergency frequencies generally cause more harm than good. Their output often interrupts messages from ambulances or fire engines. According to Sammon, "They're not true pirates."

This is the reason why broadcasting without a license is illegal. The Department of Trade and Industry will confiscate equipment, impose heavy fines or even imprison illict broadcasters. "Generally, the DTI up north are very civilised and their approach is quite humane," surmises Lamaj: "With experience, our attitude toward them has matured. I'd rather have them coming through the door than the cops any day." PARADISE have been hit by the DTI three times already this year. In London you can expect to be hit three times a month. Still, the likelihood of them going legal in the

airwaves. There are 3,000 colleges in America, most with campus radio stations. The potential is often minimised when broadcasting through internal induction loops into halls of residence; it may be ghettoised but it's guaranteed. Trevor Blackman is painfully aware of the inadequacies of British radio, "I turn to places like America, where for years there has been community access to radio and to television. In Britain, it has to change, in order to cater for what people really want. ICE is bringing a very different perspective, because we are broadcasting to a wider community and getting that community involved." One reason why pirate stations and the Free Party Movement have been criminalised is because they bring large numbers of people together. The implications of that unity are wrongly perceived as threatening.

In Newcastle, Leeds, Bradford, all across the country, young people are making a difference by changing the face of radio broadcasting in the 90s. Whether legal or illegal, the essential thing is to try and put new ideas across. The only way to make effective change takes a lot of work. If you want it there is a future for community radio. It's just a question of confidence. Look at PARADISE, ICE, DREAM. You can do it. As Brendan Flint now knows, "Everything is just waiting to happen. As soon as people realise what it could be like, it will go off with a bang."

It's 9pm and the pre-club warm-up party, Ride a Cock Horse, is rammed. Surrounded by helium filled balloons gay boys in builders' overalls and hard hats are dancing on the tables. Beautifully glamorous transvestites are going around handing out ice creams and slices of birthday cake. Tonight is going to be one hell of a party.

Tickets for the club sold out two days beforehand and the Haçienda is totally packed by 12am. At 1.30am, to the sounds of Wagner, a fireworks display ignites and the party really starts. There's an overwhelming poppers and ecstasy atmosphere and people are dancing everywhere.

Glamorous drag queens, smiling sweaty straights, barely dressed dykes and wildly dancing gay boys partying side by side. No one has any intention of stopping until the club kicks out at 6am. Then the real narcotic heads go onto the post-party party down the road. They might still be dancing now.

What's going on? Nowadays

when I tell people I'm from Manchester they don't ask me about Manchester United, they don't even ask me about Factory Records or the Mondays, they ask me if I've been to Flesh. Talk about being talked about.

Paul and Lucy are A Bit Ginger, the promotions company behind this monthly extravaganza, and they have just celebrated the Flesh second birthday. Paul was entertainments manager at the Haçienda, but left to concentrate on running Flesh. "For years I use to run all those fabulous nights at the Haçienda, but I really wanted to run a night where I could cop off", he tells me.

Unlike most club promotion teams, Paul and Lucy don't come from a musical background. "I did drama at University and come from an entertainments background", announces Paul. "Lucy and I have more of a focus on entertainment and the full event. Night clubs are the modern theatre and in our theatre the audience are let on to the

stage."

"We lovingly create each one", adds Lucy. "The first week after Flesh we religiously fill out an event report - we try to improve on the last one every time. Then we basically spend a week planning the next one and the rest of month making it a reality."

Flesh and Manchester's gay sub culture has had an undeniable effect on Manchester's clubscene as a whole. "I don't recall seeing very many straight people in gay clubs before we started Flesh", Lucy tells me. "Flesh brought together the gay community and the trendy straight crowd."

Pushed out by the ever growing violence and gangster element in their own scene, straight clubbers quickly discovered Flesh. They commonly lied about their sexuality to get through the positively discriminating door policy and away from clubs with bad attitude.

However, this is not be a unique phenomena, as Paul is keen to point out. "If you look

at the clubs in New York, Chicago, San Francisco or LA - apart from the yuppie coke clubs - the only decent clubs are gay", he says. "It's because they

find it hard to put on a street dance music night that isn't ruined by violence. Manchester has been fast heading in that direction."

However, the absence of violence and

bad attitude was not the only attraction factor. Glamorous, wild and hedonistic, the trendy gay clubs offered a new fresh feel that

more established club nights had lost. (Incidentally they were also the first to benefit from the local council's desire to win the Olympic Bid and received later licences.)

The hedonism of gay clubs is often commented on, but rarely explained. Paul has his own opinion: "gay people are more extrovert and more extreme", he says. "For many gay people night clubs are a celebration not just of themselves, but of their lifestyle. You couldn't behave in the same way walking down the street because you'd prob-

ably get beaten up or arrested."
Lensman Peter Walsh has
been snapping in clubland for
over six years and was keen to
voice his opinion on the subject. "It's because gay people
are so repressed in our society", he says. "When they go
into a club, and they know
they're not going to get hassled, you get three or four
weeks of repressed hedonism
unleashed in six hours."

Bringing the young trendy gay crowd and the straight crowd together at Flesh has had major effects on the whole of the Manchester clubscene. Mixed clubbing is more com-

mon, and The Paradise Factory, opened at the beginning of the summer for faggots and their friends, is a living, breathing and sweating example.

Tim Lennox, who use to DJ at Flesh and now spins the wheels of confusion at the Paradise Factory, thinks that the success of mixed clubbing in Manchester is down to the absence of violence. "If there's one thing that frightens the gangs off it's having their bum pinched", he says and laughs. "A few trannies and the wankers steer well clear." It has been said that it's trendy to be gay. "On the clubscene that has definitely been the case"

the clubscene that has definitely been the case", Paul agrees. "I think it can only have positive effects. However, there's a fine line between being influenced by and appreciating a sub culture and ripping it off. If it's trendy to be gay I'd hope that it was gay people who were benefiting from it."

Appreciation to one side, I wanted to know exactly how much influence this sub culture has had on the overall Manchester clubscene? "In terms of

glamour, in terms of sex and in terms of fun the gay scene's influence has been dramatic", claims Paul. "The camp face of the gay scene has been

very important - the reduction in seriousness and increase in the fun factor."

Lucy feels the needs to be a bit more specific, "Flesh was the only place women could go and

dance in their bra and knickers and not get hassled", she says. "Now they're starting to feel safe enough to be able to do that in straight clubs." Peter Walsh has also noticed what you might call 'the return of sex'. "Fashion in the straight scene is now a lot more sexy and that's because of the gay scene", he says. "More straight people are McDermott has been DJing at Flesh since it started and is keen to point that, "when Saturday Night Fever came out and disco died, the gay boys were

the only ones who kept dancing. The high energy basis of the house music scene is down to the gay boys who just wouldn't let it die."

Arguably true, but it doesn't stop there. Paul wants to attribute "the whole origin of night clubs and disco culture" to the gay scene in America, especially San Francisco.

With all this in mind, and after Peter Walsh's convincing argument that, "it all happens in the gay clubs first", I feel it is my duty to warn you that we might be in for an early eighties revival. If you haven't already noticed, the music is already getting a pounding and the appearance of high legged army boots, with tucked in combat trousers and bomber jackets, may serve only as a further warning of impending doom.

Even after all of this the Bit Ginger experience doesn't stop there. Manchester's newest asset, Home, plays host to Paul and Lucy's latest night,

The World At Home. This Saturday night experience is ridiculously popular and the queues are reminiscent of days gone by. They unashamedly started out with the aim of "putting the glamour back into the straight scene".

Music wise they simply put on the Flesh DJs. "The musical vibe of Flesh makes it work", announces Paul. "Where the national straight scene has got into a real dead end is on the progressive house thing. It's serious train spotter music and you get the crowd

you deserve. Our DJs play a whole variety of music and it's all happy party music."

He's opinionated and also very proud of A Bit Ginger's DJ line up. "In a business that's dominated by white straight males its good that we've used five female DJs out of six and that we've not been reliant on 'big name DJs'", he says.


Gay promoters running a straight night is unusual, but Lucy is definitely happy with the outcome. "It's a thrill that A Bit Ginger can have such an impact in the straight clubbing world", she enthuses. "However, we could never run a completely straight night, we had to have the camp ambience and the glitter around the edges. Two years ago it wouldn't have occurred to me to run a straight night, but the crowd has changed and is a lot more tolerant." It would seem Lucy is not alone in noticing the difference. The Haçienda have recently hired Tim

Lennox, together with Alistair Whitehead, to DJ Friday nights. "We went out to do something totally different - more camp and fun party

things - like booking TWA", Tim tells me. "The key is not to take yourself or your music too seriously." And just out of interest, the Friday night crowd

has jumped from 300-400 to 1500 in under seven weeks.







IT'S GOT TO BE SAID. MEETING THE MINDS BEHIND RAVE RECORDS OPENED UP A WHOLE WORLD OF ACTIVITY OF WHICH THEIR VINYL RELEASES ARE JUST A PART. RAVE WORKS AS AN OUTLET FOR THE HARD MUSIC CREATED IN AND AROUND THE DUTCH TOWN OF DEN HAAG, MORE COMMONLY KNOWN AS THE HAGUE, AND BOASTS A REPERTOIRE FEATURING SUCH LUMINARIES AS GIZMO, BUZZ FUZZ, THE DARK RAVER AS WELL AS THE SEVENTEEN YEAR OLD ECH HEFTAG WHO ALSO CREATES TRAX UNDER THE PSEUDONYM THE DIRECTOR. THE LABEL BEGAN LIFE IN AUGUST 1991 USING THE NAME CITY RECORDS, UNLEASHING FIVE EPS, BUT THEN EARLY LAST YEAR IT ADOPTED THE NEW IDENTITY FOR WHICH IT IS RENOWNED TODAY, NOTCHING UP A PHENOMENAL 29 RELEASES IN ITS TIME. SUCH HAS BEEN THEIR SUCCESS THAT A NEW SUBSIDIARY LABEL, HARDSTUFF RECORDS, HAS ALREADY BEEN SET UP TO DEAL WITH MATERIAL OF A MORE MANIC NATURE, ABLY ASSISTED BY THE WORK OF ZULTAN AND DJ HOUSEVIKING, WHOSE LAUNCHING TWELVES HAVE HELPED PUT THE LABEL FIRMLY ON THE MUSICAL MAP, ALONG WITH ITS CURIOUS CANNABIS LEAF LOGO.

Rave Records is co-ordinated by Stefan and his team who are based at Stad Den Haag Records out in the suburbs. An additional outlet can be found at the centre of town run by several of the labels artists including Gizmo, whose wealth of experience as a DJ renders him capable of spinning any style from hip hop and house to the hardest techno. To seek out one of his house sets, however, follow the flyers that herald the presence of Ferry Salee, for that is his house tag. Under the alias of Gizmo, though, he is a busy remixer, recently having added his own breakbeat led style to 'Acid Yell' by Deaz.D who borrows that infamous and one time irritating chant of 'Acieed' that once gave



D-mob fame, and also the hilarious B.O.T.T.R.O.P. from DJ Hooligan.

And there's more. A further room tucked away back at the shop reveals a radio station in full force. Initially on the airwaves as an illegally transmitting pirate, Radio Den Haag succeeded in obtaining legal agreement from the powers that be and now broadcast daily on

97.2FM with a selection that is predominantly house, and introduced by a variety of personalities that come into their own when presented with the microphone.

Some of the earlier Rave releases are now extremely hard to find, especially The Powerdrome EP (which even I can't locate after having my copy confiscated by a government department who wish to incinerate it for having been illegally broadcast) but it's sure to be played by the label's DJs at Rave Records' excellent parties known as 'Rave The City'. If you want to chase up their available back catalogue then here's a full up to date discography:


199 AYEAR TO REMEMBER

I DON'T WANT TO BE LIKE THE OTHER JOURNOS AND REVIEW 1993 IN JANUARY, JANUARY IS THE FIRST MONTH OF A NEW YEAR AND TO LOOK BACK THEN IS IN MY OPINION UNHEALTHY. ANYWAY, 1993 WAS CERTAINLY A WEIRD OLD YEAR WHEN COMMERCIAL RAVE AND HARDCORE LET OUT ITS LAST EXHAUSTED BREATH, THE 303 MACHINE CAME INTO VOGUE AGAIN AND SELDOM DID WHAT THE PURISTS WANTED. GABBER REPLACED BREAKBEATS FOR DJS WITH NO TASTE AND DEPLETING BANK BALANCES, TECHNO CLUBS SPRANG UP AS QUICKLY AS THEY DISAPPEARED AND RADIO ONE CHANGED ITS POLICY, GOT RID OF THE OLD AND REPLACED IT WITH YOUNGER VERSIONS OF THE OLD (EXCLUDING JOHN PEEL OF COURSE).

It was the year Carl Craig released the sublimely beautiful "Desire" on Infonet, Jeff Mills released the best double pack of the year, "Waveform Vol 1", Suburban Knight returned with an extremely large and well received twelve, Mike Inc, Thomas Heckmann & Roland Casper came bounding in from Germany, and Black Dog gave us "Bytes". It was the year Jeff "prolific fucker" Mills kept coming back and gave us X103, Millsart and remixed "Equinox". When Mark Cage supplied us with "Gravitational Arch of Ten" and Juan Atkins did "Jazz is the Teacher". In my opinion 1993 was a very important year for purist Techno, it really came through and evolved heathily and taught the media that it was a serious form of music that was here to stay no matter how much it was written about (remember Progressive?).

However, the direction of Techno changed notably also in 1993 and re-invented the subculture of minimal Chicago grooves. Djax from Holland are to thank for this as it was this label's foresight that I believe was ultimately responsible. All of a sudden Mike Dunn, Armando, Poindexter and K Alexi came back into the light that last shone upon them at the end of the 1980s, and deservedly so. And it was this move that made techno roots that much more accessible to newcomers to the scene and therefore helped inject some healty Oxyhaemaglobin into an oxygen depleted part of the scene.

On a personal level Magnetic North has gone from strength to strength with interest and sales going up and I must also say respect was coming in more also – thanx. Other UK labels that did well were Peacefrog, Warp and General Productions who





all pushed back boundaries that much further. Evolution (who went down with Great Asset) released some corkers and got themselves an album deal (Reload) with Chris Abbots Infonet operation.

The bad aspects of 1993 aren't as bad as the darkness that enveloped 1992, but there were a


few points, most noticeably the further bastardization of the word Techno. DJs worried about the collapse of the rave scene jumped on the bandwagon and exclaimed to the world that they were now playing techno and have always played techno, but they weren't, never had and everyone knew this except for the gullible (dropped one to many) punters, desperate promoters and shit thick media. Next year the last three categories might not be so easily fooled so get your H.P. paid off now! For those who don't know what Techno means, here's a definition from someone who cares:

"A music which is put together with care, that doesn't use gimmicks but can be ambient as well as hard and has a very long shelf life indeed", and on that note I'd like to thank everyone that stayed true to the cause – you know who you are.



INCOGNITO "GIVING IT UP"

Heaps of chiming and booming bass stabs introduce a tune geared for the Christmas season, and as always the standards employed are exceptionally high, re-establishing a level of musicality that has been in decline for some time now. A passing vocal in 'Future' makes itself known by dropping in like an aeroplane flying past and disappears just as quick. 'Be There' is beat led all the way, a DJ's delight when it comes to the crossfader, however the effect is something like jungled up garage - a direction a lot of tune creators are heading in these days. 'Renegade Snares' on the Y-side succeeds in being far more daring and neither dark nor happy, it simply pursues a line of thought that can bring a tear to the eye. Warlock

PIGBAG "DEAL WITH IT"

Two tearaway tunes that combine the happy hardcore vibe with a talented drum and bass workout. Even a few rave classics manage to get a shout and are boosted into action by the feet friendly breaks that arrive totally on cue every time. Make sure the bass control is on top whack as each track is gifted with a knowing bassline designed for maximum kickability, especially the one to be found in 'Dance Freak'. For a vinyl debut there is no reason why this should not do well.

MIX FACTORY "MIRACLES"

Certainly a curious release worth searching out as it comes via a double pack of nine varied mixes mainly of garage, house and trance and worth buying if that's your flavour. How-ever, get to the versions on side C and an unexpected barrage of hardcore beats proves to be an additional mix arranged by DJ XTC that bares little relation to the more down tempo reworkings. Adopting Rufige Kru's Ter minator as its main theme, the rhythm is fresh and fuses mentasm noises with a dark feel provided by haunting strings and a stark bass solo that occurs midway through. Not what you would expect but it is sure to please. Warlock

Witnessing a party of a good few thousand people outside the UK can certainly be an eye opener for the uninitiated observer. It became strangely apparent that the event and all it entailed had much in common with one of our very homegrown raves. A big sports hall on the outskirts of Den Helder, way up on the northern coastal reaches of Holland played host to one of that nation's greatest and least acknowledged exports, curiously known locally as 'Hardcore' but requiring an English translation of hard techno. The only breakbeats to be found were those used frenetically in the background of the latest Rotterdam tracks, and, by the way, you'd

be hard pressed to find a bassline in the place.

The 'Raisers of Hell' as the flyer described the DJs, was an allusion to the harder orientation of the talented Continental spinners present, including

energy of the place.

Andy Dux from Germany's
Overdrive as well as the hardest of the
hard Lisa 'n' Eliaz from Belgium who ended the show
on the toughest note possible. Representing the
native land were Rob from Rotterdam records with his
earbashing collection of party anthems and also BuzzFuzz whose set was comparable to an unending supply
of Prodigy records on 45 aided by the vinyl creations
of The Speedfreak. I'm sure you can imagine the

Representing the UK were Loftgroover and Colin Dale, both offering a different approach to playing techno with a helping hand from a variety of British material only they know how to find, especially Loft's

own duplates featuring the work of himself with Jack Smooth. And for a DJ/producer renowned for his more trancey acid interest, Damon Wild from New York's Experimental label tore down the place with a set of pure metallic music, playing such recent classics as Industrial Strength's 'Fucking Hostile' and 'Senseless' by Zekt. An unmissable set.

The crowd were a lively bunch, too. As the promoter himself said, "in England your ravers dance more with their arms whereas over here there is a tendency to jump up and down." Sounds curious but

the fashions these party people choose to wear. On the male side of things it's a proliferation of shaved heads greatly outnumbering the amount of ponytails, however jeans and trainers still seem to be the order of the day. For the girls its all black skimpy gear, often in leather and nearly always accompanied by black Doc Marten style boots making for a look that's more interchangeable with our female housers than our lycra clad ravettes.

Unfortunately, though, this and other parties like it are suffering criticism from representatives of the church who, by peacefully handing out religious

leaflets, claim that young people are being exposed to "devil music". It's a subject that is being milked for all it's worth by the Dutch media, misquoting people and blowing the whole story out of all proportion, the same way the tabloids in the UK created a moral


panic with the acid house thing back in 89. Seems like an echo of past complaints aimed at rock music, but then I'm sure those fears never materialised did they?

Taking into account the high standard of the light show which was more akin to that found at an extravagant live gig, it was easily worth the entrance fee of £16 for 12 hours of fun, especially as there was a fair chance of discovering the location of another party to visit afterwards. So if your interest has been aroused watch out for the Hellraiser parties scheduled for New Year's Eve and February. They won the safe,

when you visit a Dutch rave, all will become clear, for to see the crowd from the lofty position of the stage resembles a mass aerobics sessions of whose participants have no problem keeping up with the tempo in excess of 170 bpm. Stand on one of the many massive dance platforms for a while and it will become apparent that quite a few people are repeatedly jogging around the stadium, quite slowly and in time with the beat, for what reason we don't know, but they sure seemed to be having a good time.

Just as the music is slightly different so too are

MY MUM MIGHT HAVE READ THAT, AND WHAT WOULD SHE HAVE THOUGHT?"

What indeed? But happily Fabio's approach to his set, stimulants aside, is as uncompromising as it always has been, and this above all else is perhaps the reason for his current success, both in clubland and in the studio. "I used to play to the crowd, but I don't now. People say that's playing with your head up your arse, but if that's the attitude everyone took, the music would never progress. Anyway, I tend to pull a crowd that want to be educated and not expect a typical night out. The crowd now is more intelligent than it's ever been and I feel more comfortable in a more specialist area."

If Fabio's exact sound is not one he'd label as "progressive" (I didn't know what the term meant a year ago, and I don't know now - it's meaningless), what is it? Apart from the trademark percussion, that is, which he freely admits made mixing easier in the early days. Subtlety must play a large part in any attempt at a definition. Fabi's passing comment "the blatant hands in the air thing is not what I'm about at all" is demonstrative of his respect in the ability of the dancefloor to appreciate the sophisticated. Or as he put it himself: "people can pick up on rhythms just as easily as a piano break...DJing is about educating, not dominating the floor".

The Birth of Shiva Shanti, the Paras album released some eight weeks ago, alludes in name and in style to another facet of his sound. Eastern rhythms and instrumentals pepper the vinyl like corriander in a chicken korma, but are happily not indicative of any New Age hippiness or cosmic crap. "Yeah, I'm into ethnic sounds and regional folk melodies...I'm really into the sort of stuff that Ravi Shankar puts out, but don't get

me wrong I'm not one of these people who go to Goa and never come back. All I like to do is take a traditional sound and make it contemporary."

Studio work is coming thick and fast of late, especially on the remix front. Some Other People's album "Orbitality" is set for a total reworking, and other people's 12'" material



is having to be increasingly turned down. Especially tracks that are good in the first place, it would seem. Explains Fabi: "In all fairness I think the records I have had to remix were shit. Remixing shit records makes sense, I'd prefer to take a bad record and turn it into something playable than get on with something that's really good. If it's good it should be left alone." Exactly.



THIS IS THE MAN THAT PUT A GROUP TOGETHER CALLED SHALAMAR AND SOLD A MILLION COPIES OF THEIR DEBUT SINGLE WHEN OTHERS WERE TELLING HIM DISCO WAS DEAD. THIS IS THE MAN WHO STARTED A COMPILATION LABEL WHICH IS NOW UP TO ITS 16TH ALBUM WHEN OTHERS WERE FOLDING. THIS IS THE MAN CALLED IAN DEWHIRST.

WHEN IAN DEWHIRST LAUNCHED THE MASTERCUTS SERIES TWO YEARS AGO HE COULDN'T HAVE DREAMT THE SERIES WOULD SET NEW PRECEDENTS IN THE ALREADY OVER CROWDED COMPILATION MARKET AND ESTABLISH COMBINED SELLS TO DATE APPROACHING 400,000. THE SERIES HAS LAUNCHED COLLECTIONS OF JAZZ-FUNK, SWING, FUNK, RARE GROOVES, P-FUNK AND SALSOUL CLASSICS AMONGST ITS FOLD, THE MOST RECENT EDITION BEING A SELECTION OF `CLASSIC 80'S GROOVES'.

WAR WITH THEM"

A survivor of the music industry for over twenty years, the Yorkshireman first started out in the late 60s as a teenager hooked on the early roots of the developing Northern Soul scene. Becoming one of the keynote DJs at the time along side the likes of Colin Curtis and Ian Levine, Dewhirst's passion for the music lead him on numerous record finding missions to America, where eventually he set up business with Neil Rushton (Network Records MD). On one such visit in 1976, whilst in a club, the idea of making a record along similar lines to the Ritchie Family's `Best Disco In Town' but quoting UK disco hits instead, came to him.

Taking a step further, he thought what would work best would be a medley of Motown anthems record to a disco beat. Shalamar was born and the resulting record `Uptown Festival' became a top 10 American hit spending six weeks at No.1 in the R&B chart selling a million in the process.

Prior to being sacked from Island's 4th + Broadway label in 1987, which he puts down to personal differences with the MD and the lack of backing for the artists and material he wanted to invest in, Dewhirst ran EMI's dance department. A label he also sees as being totally corporate where one decision required twelve department heads approval to be passed. "I had a good run there," he starts

whilst perusing the menu as we chat-...YOU DIDN'T FUCK WITH DMC ted at over lunch at a riverside restaurant. "My first record was Ashford & Simpson's `Solid', which was a great start 'CAUSE THEY WERE PRETTY as it went to No.2. Then came Maze, Lillo Thomas, Freddie Jackson, Jaki Graham, Tavares' remixes and I brought the Pet Shop Boys in, that's something that not many people know. I'd been in Ibiza and heard the original of `West End Girls' played at all the clubs over there. It was released here on Epic at the time but unbelievably it did nothing. I brought them to the

attention of EMI, but you how it is at the majors, somebody else always gets the credit! The re-recorded version went to No.1, I had nine weeks at No.1 over one Christmas with them there for five weeks and Diana Ross' Chain Reaction' for four weeks. That was a real wally type record, but when I saw the video I knew it couldn't fail."

Hooking up with Mahesh Bajaj in the late 80's they launched Serious Records to take on Morgan Khan's Street Sounds compilation empire. The first `Upfront' album sold 60,000, at the time totally unheard of for a specialist dance collection. After a short six month stay 4th + Broadway came calling, where in a nine month period he was responsible for Sly & Robbie's only UK hit, CJ Mackintosh's first commercial remix and signing Nellee Hooper and The Wild Bunch, later to reincarnate into Soul II Soul and Massive Attack.

At this point the likeable man remembers possible the true reason behind his Island departure. "I openly had a go at DMC (the publishers of Mixmag) over the judging of their mixing championships. I was on the panel in Newcastle one particular year and we'd discovered CJ some weeks before and unbeknown to us he couldn't get in any of the London or Southern heats and he turned up in Newcastle.

I said to the crew at DMC `have you seen this guy play, he's something else' and they said 'well he's not as good as our Chad (Jackson)'. The whole set up was very incestuous and so I said `how can you say that until you've seen him?', not realising that they had their own reasons for wanting certain people to win.

Then, at the finals, they had a judging panel that was anything but impartial, they had about five DMC managed people on it. At the time, though, that was the way the record industry worked, you didn't fuck with DMC 'cause they were pretty powerful. I was at war with them."

"4th + Broadway had a box at the finals and we couldn't believe the result, nor could the crowd as they started throwing cans and bottles at the stage. Afterwards Christine Prince of DMC came up to me looking all pleased by the result and asked me what I thought. I told her it was a disgrace, Chad didn't win it, and I'm a mate of his, but the fact of the matter is he

shouldn't have won it. I more or less told them I thought the whole thing was rigged, I was the only one to speak up, everyone else sat on the fence 'cause it was safer. Then Music Week rang me up to ask my opinion, I told them I thought in future years they should use a more impartial judging panel, that was then printed. The day after I got a lawyer's letter from Tony Prince (DMC MD) and a phone call from him saying that they were considering suing me for libel. Four to six weeks after I got bounced from Island. I can only presume that Tony Prince is a pretty powerful guy and I then I had a real hard time trying to get another job. Some of the stories that started circulating about me as to why I got sacked were incredible. One was that I sold 58 acid tabs at an Island party. There might've been a slight element of truth in that, but it certainly wasn't 58!"

Returning to Serious, the following period Dewhirst describes as "a two year blur". "Me and Mahesh went to New York every six weeks and basically went wild and crazy. Mahesh was like that, he came from Luton, then discovered the West End and then New York! It didn't take any encouragement from me to fly Concorde over there, then get a limo from the airport to an expensive hotel and then out every night clubbing. But we still got the albums out. although the discipline was at rock bottom. Back home we were smoking dope every night,

> getting in at seven every morning, dragging our arses out of bed at twelve and then doing a few hours work before going out again. It totally pre-dated the Happy Monday's Manchester E' mentality! We were there three years ahead of all that."

POWERFUL. I WAS AT "Predictably the whole thing caved in after about two years and we all went our separate ways. He's made it a life's work going bust! I used to do the chart hyping at that time, myself and Damon Rochefort (Nomad/Serious Rope) would get in a car with a thousand

albums and point it in the direct of the North and try and hit various towns where we knew there was a good nightlife, Newcastle, Manchester, Liverpool, Birmingham. During the day we'd supposedly be hyping the records in the charts, but in actual fact we were flogging them and coming back with tonnes of cash!"

By November 1990, having accumulated close to £20,000 in debt and a repossession order issued for his house, Dewhirst decided enough was enough, no more wild drug binges and all night parties, time for action was needed. "I'd been semi black listed by all the major labels for being too wild, so the phone wasn't ringing off the hook with job offers, so I went into the West End and just started looking through the record racks. I kept coming back to the compilations, they all had tacky covers, 'As seen on TV' stickers and there was very little there that I thought was well packaged or credible. It clicked then that there was a gap in the market for a well packaged double album of original mixes with detailed personal sleeve notes.

Mastercuts evolved out of that. I spent the next two weeks coming up with design ideas and sorting out the records." From a collection approaching 40,000 records, no less then 56 albums worth of material for the series was compiled. "It was perhaps the most pleasurable period in my life. I spent two weeks just listening to records, I started at `A' and didn't stop 'til I got to the end. I ended up with a series of series, for example for the `Classic Jazz-Funk' alone, without scraping the barrel or going ridiculously left-field, there's probably a good 9 or 10 albums."

And what's in the pipeline for the coming year? Hints were dropped regarding a set based on material from the early 80s... Ian Dewhirst is a survivor and a real character in an otherwise bland industry where success and results are more important then integrity and respect, and where enthusiasm and passion for music doesn't form part of the equation. Long may he continue. Lunch was good too! Lewis Dene
